Browning, Captain Miles R., USN (USNA, 1918)

In 1943-44 served as the first commanding officer of the aircraft carrier *Hornet* (CV-12), 112, 119-122, 129-130, 137, 140-141

***Bunker Hill*, USS (CV-17)**

Took Air Group 15 back to the United States in late 1944 after its combat deployment, 220-221

Burnham, Ensign W. T., USNR

McC Campbell's wingman who was killed by anti-aircraft fire during an attack on Marcus Island in May 1944, 148-149

Callaghan, Commander Daniel J., USN (USNA, 1911)

In the mid-1930s was executive officer of the heavy cruiser *Portland* (CA-33), 41, 45

Site of Army training in the 1920s, 5-6

Support of Air Group 15 in the aircraft carriers *Hornet* (CV-12) and *Essex* (CV-9) in 1944, 111, 120

Carter, President James E., Jr. (USNA, 1947)

Cassady, Commander John H., USN (USNA, 1919)

Served in the early 1940s as air officer of the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7), 85

In February 1944 was removed as commanding officer of Bombing Squadron 15
(VB-15) on board the aircraft carrier *Hornet* (CV-12), 119-121

Dickey, Commander Fred Clinton, USN

Served as executive officer of the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7) in the early 1940s, 83,
103

Doyle, Lieutenant Austin K., USN (USNA, 1920)

On the Naval Academy staff in the early 1930s, 17, 21

Drane, Commander William M., USN (USNA, 1930)

In February 1944 was removed as Commander Air Group 15 (CAG-15) on board the aircraft carrier *Hornet* (CV-12), 119-120

Duncan, Lieutenant Commander George E., USN

Fighter pilot who flew from the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9) in 1944, 135

Einstein, Professor Albert

In the early 1950s declined to have a building at the Technical Training Center in Jacksonville named for him, 290

As NATO Supreme Allied Commander in the early 1950s visited the aircraft carrier *Franklin D. Roosevelt* (CVB-42), 241

In 1944 was navigator and mess treasurer of the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9), 187-188

In 1959 served as chief of staff to Commander Carrier Division Three, 342-343

Combat operations in 1944 from the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9), 123-126, 137-138, 141-150, 160-164, 171-220, 273-274, 307-314
Nicknames of McCampbell's planes, 126

F8F Bearcat

Hot new Grumman fighter that McCampbell flew shortly after World War II, but not in combat, 271-273

F9F/F9F-6/8 Cougar

Grumman fighter that provided jet training for McCampbell in the mid-1950s, 297-298, 337
Pilot killed in the mid-1950s while testing an F9F, 299

F11F Tiger

Formed a stunt team in the air group of the aircraft carrier *Bon Homme Richard* (CVA-31) in the late 1950s, 363-364

Fairbanks, Lieutenant (junior grade) Douglas E., Jr., USNR

Actor who served for a time in 1942 as a reserve officer on board the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7), 93

Farenholt, USS (DD-491)

Rescued survivors from the sinking of the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7) in September 1942, 104-107

Felt, Admiral Harry D., USN (USNA, 1923)

Briefly commanded the Sixth Fleet in 1956, 300, 305-306, 319

The aircraft carrier *Bon Homme Richard* (CVA-31) got under way unexpectedly early while in Pearl Harbor on 7 December 1959, 344-346

Houston, USS (CA-30)

As President in the mid-1930s, Franklin Roosevelt made a fishing trip in the ship, 37-39

Iceland

U.S. Navy ships escorted convoys to Reykjavik early in World War II, 88

Intelligence

Role of combat intelligence officers in Air Group 15 in 1944, 154-157, 169

Ise (Japanese Battleship)

Attacked by U.S. carrier planes on 25 October 1944, during the Battle of Leyte Gulf, 207

Iwo Jima

Attacks on by Air Group 15 from the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9) in June 1944, 173-175

Jackson, Rear Admiral Andrew M., Jr., USN (USNA, 1930)

Served in 1959-60 as Commander Carrier Division Three, 343-344, 348-349

Japan

In 1959 the aircraft carrier *Bon Homme Richard* (CVA-31) collided with a small freighter in the Inland Sea of Japan, 340-341

Visits to various Japanese ports in 1959 by the *Bon Homme Richard*, 342

Kane, Lieutenant Commander William R., USN (USNA, 1933)

Pilot who was shot down during the Marianas campaign in June 1944, 184-185

Kennedy, President John F.

Events connected with his inauguration in January 1961, 236-239

McCampbell met Kennedy at receptions in the early 1960s, 240-241

Kernodle, Commander Michael H., USN (USNA, 1921)

Served as air officer of the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7) at the beginning of World War II, 79, 85

Served as LSO in the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7) in the early 1940s, 69-70, 72-74

In 1942-43 ran pilot training at Cecil Field in Jacksonville, 109

Lake Champlain, USS (CVS-39)

Refueled from the fleet oiler *Severn* (AO-61) in 1958, 330

Lambert, Lieutenant Commander Valdemar G., USN

Commanded Torpedo Squadron 15 (VT-15) on board the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9) in 1944, 132-133, 207, 273-274

Landing Signal Officers

McC Campbell's service in the aircraft carrier *Wasp* (CV-7), 1940-42, 69-100

In 1942-43 McC Campbell ran the landing signal officer school in Melbourne, Florida, 66-67, 69, 109-110

Langley, USS (CVL-27)

McC Campbell landed on board after his successful mission of 24 October 1944 in the Battle of Leyte Gulf, 203-205

Lebanon

Relationship with the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the late 1950s, 321-322, 324-325, 332-333

Killed when the ship sank in September 1942, 79

Lexington, USS (CV-16)

Actions against the Japanese in 1944, 166-168, 185-186, 200, 206, 208, 215-216

Leyte Gulf, Battle of

Participation in by Air Group 15 from the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9), 139, 142-147, 192-193, 198-209, 218

Role of U.S. submarines, 198-199

Use of kamikazes by the Japanese in the battle, 142-143, 146-147

On 24 October 1944 McCampbell and his wingman Roy Rushing shot down 15 Japanese planes between them, 142-145, 160-161, 199-206, 218, 300-301

Mariana Islands

Support of the U.S. invasion in 1944 by Air Group 15 from the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9), 147-148, 152, 154-155, 172, 176-185, 187-188, 190, 314

Commander Naval Forces Marianas, Rear Admiral William Erdmann, smuggled liquor to the United States in 1959-60, 349-351

Marianas Turkey Shoot

Actions by Air Group 15 from the aircraft carrier *Essex* (CV-9) on 19 June 1944, 147-148, 172, 179-182, 187-188
